FY'16 tax rates set

Belchertown sees slight increase

BELCHERTOWN - The town BELCHERTOWN – The town has set its tax rate for Fiscal Year 2016. Residents will see a slight increase in their bills, with the new rate set at \$17.97 per thousand valuation, versus last year's

\$17.89. Director of Assessments Jay Whelihan appeared before the Belehertown Board of Selectmen during the annual tax classification hearing, and provided selectmen with information and relevant data regarding the allo-cation of the property tax levy among residential and business

taxpayers.
Whelihan told board members, since 1980 each municipality has had the option to apply a single, uniform tax rate to all properties

Granby rate to increase by 3%

GRANBY – A property tax rate of \$18.87 per \$1,000 valuation, up 3 percent from last fiscal year's 18.31 rate, was approved by the select board Monday and will be submitted to the state for final approval.

The Board of Assessors presented the new rate for Fiscal

sented the new rate for Fiscal Year 2016, which began July 1, 2015 and ends June 30, 2016, during a public hearing. Bills reflecting the taxes owed by property owners will be mailed out on Jan. 1.

out on Jan. 1.

Assessors reported that the average value of a home in Granby is now \$222,097, an increase of \$910 over last fiscal year. The median value of a home is \$207,600, up \$500 from the last fiscal year. The median value means half of all homes are worth more than that amount are worth more than that amount,

and half are worth less.

Therefore, the taxes on an average home valued

or adopt different rates for residential and commercial

According to Department of Revenue guidelines, the maximum percentage shift that the commercial, industrial and personal property class (CIP) can bear is 150 percent. Last year, selectmen chose not to shift any of the tax burden from the residential to the commercial

classes. The same will be true this year.

The DOR computation for Belchertown shows the residential class making up 92.5 percent of the tax base, while the commercial class makes up 7.5 percent.

This year's levy limit includes an increase in new growth, up by \$76,541 from last year. The overall levy limit is \$24,227,554, an increase of \$926,349, but after including a debt exclusion of \$439,194 (what's remaining on the Belchertown High School bond), the maximum allowable levy is \$24,666,748.

Whelihan said, however, the town has chosen not to set the rate based on the maximum allowable levy, which would have been \$18 per thousand. Whelihan also shared that the bond for Swift River Elementary School has come off the books this year.

Based on averages, owners of a single family home in

Belchertown valued at \$251,096 will pay \$4,512 in taxes annually; owners of a two-or-three family home valued at \$231,426 will pay \$4,158; owners of a condo valued at \$166,337 will pay \$2,989; owners of commercial property valued at \$456,820 will pay \$8,209; and owners of industrial property valued at \$191,861 will pay \$3,447

The increase per year for a single-family home, on average, will be \$68.

Last year, on a list of 12 area communities, Belehertown had the seventh highest tax rate. In order, those communities included: Wilbraham, Pelham, Amherst, Ware, Palmer, Granby, Belchertown, Ludlow, South Hadley, Southwick, Northampton and Hadley. The highest rate - in Wilbraham - was set at \$21,60, and the lowest – in Hadley – was set at \$10.86. Whelihan did not have those rates yet for this year's comparison.


